



Survival

Reach consensus as a group about how to “survive” the scenario

TIME

10-20 minutes



MATERIALS

Paper, pens, list of objects

TEAM STAGE

Storming, Norming

SUMMARY

This activity asks groups to rank items in order of importance to their survival in a certain scenario. Participants must be creative and communicative as they try to problem solve, resolve conflict between members, and reach consensus.

SET UP

- Decide on a “survival scenario”. Examples:
 - Your group’s plane has crash landed on a deserted island.
 - You woke up in the middle of a zombie apocalypse.
 - You must save the world from an alien invasion.
- Create a list of 12-15 items and objects your group can use to survive this scenario. They could be actually useful items (like water, rope, and matches) or random items (like tape, a chair, and a trash can), it is up to you.
- Print a copy of the list to give to each group, or prepare a poster with the list.

INSTRUCTIONS

- Divide participants into smaller groups of four or five.
- Pass out a piece of paper and a pen to each small group.
- Tell participants that their objective is to determine the usefulness of each item listed based on the given situation.
- They will need to rank the items in order of usefulness (item number 1 is the most useful) and provide their reasoning.
- They must reach consensus, meaning that everyone must agree on the final ranking of items.

VARIATIONS

- Start by having participants decide whether they should go out and seek help or stay put and wait to be found.
- Ask participants to rank the items individually before breaking them up into small groups. Have them share their rationale before challenging them to reach consensus as a group about what items are most useful.
- Make up a “series of unfortunate events” that may occur at any point during the decision-making process. These events may change groups priorities or render certain items more or less useful depending on the event. For example, “it starts to storm on the island you are stranded on” or “one of your group members starts to become ill for seemingly no reason”.



VARIATIONS *(continued)*

-  **Small Group:** To facilitate this activity for a small group, have all participants come to a consensus together instead of dividing them into small groups.
-  **Online:** To facilitate this activity virtually, provide the scenario and list of items in the chat or in a shared document that everyone can refer to. Put each group into a breakout room to discuss and make their decisions, then bring everyone back to the main meeting room to share.

DEBRIEF QUESTIONS

- What:
 - How do you feel about the final list your group came up with?
 - What was easy or difficult about getting everyone in your group to agree?
 - So What:
 - Why is consensus important with collaborative work?
 - What are some factors that can make coming to a consensus difficult? What are some factors that can make it easy?
 - Now What:
 - What are some examples of times when your group may need to come to a consensus?
 - How can you help your group arrive at a consensus?
-  **Facilitator Note:** These questions can be used to guide your debrief, however, pick the questions that best match your group's experience and add or change questions as needed.
